Subject: Proposed Sunrise Powerlink Project - Opposition to the Mataguay Substation and "Top of the World" Alternatives

Dear Ms. Blanchard,

Thank you for your process insights and for facilitating a meeting at Mataguay Scout Ranch on Monday, June 11, where we met with representatives from SDG&E, Vista Irrigation District and California Public Utilities Commission/Bureau of Land Management (CPUC/BLM) Aspen Environmental Group Consultants, Fritts Golden and Michael Clayton to discuss the proposed Sunrise Powerlink project. Attached is the CPUC/BLM record of conversation from the meeting. Please note that the San Diego-Imperial Council, Boy Scouts of America with over 40,000 children and leaders are in strong opposition to a possible "Top of the World" site for a substation, as well as, the related power lines proposed to leave that site.

Generations of Scouts have enjoyed over 50 years of wilderness experiences in Mataguay Scout Ranch's 842 acre pristine environment and the "Top of the World" location would visually impair this experience for generations of children to come. A new board adopted Mataguay Master Plan provides a blueprint to carefully manage program areas to optimize usage capacity without adversely impacting the quality of the multi-faceted activities.

The two lakes and year-round running creek, the pristine expansive canopy of native oaks (some over 500 years old) and the deep ranching heritage of the property attracts many users who seek a wholesome escape from our urban lifestyles.

Attached, please find a recap of the Mataguay Scout Ranch assets which support extensive outdoor training and recreational adventures. Over 30,000 user days were logged in 2006 and usage is now beginning to go up (sign ups this summer are up nearly 50%) as the new Master Plan begins to be implemented.

The Scouts implore the leadership at California Public Utilities Commission and Bureau of Land Management, to remove the "Top of the World" site from consideration, as it would do immeasurable visual harm and have a negative impact on thousands of users who come to Mataguay for a high quality nature experience in a county with very few special places left to visit.

SUBJECT: Proposed substation and transmission alignment; Top of the World substation alt and 230 kV						
Board Member, discussed at length the camp's 50 year plus history, objectives, and future plans. The Scouts have 8,500 Adult Leaders and nearly 35,000 registered Youth members from our local communities, many of whom have used this property for outdoor education and environmental programs. The Scouts communicated strong opposition to the consideration of the "Top of the World" site for a substation alternative and placement of power lines inside the ridgeline to visually impair the pristine nature of this remote 850 acre Scout Camp. The group toured through the extent of the property and visited the Top of the World alternative substation site. Terry Trout and Dale Long pointed out various program areas and trails that exist or are anticipated to be developed.  The primary objections volced by BSA representatives were with regard to the TOTW alternative substation site and the associated 230 kV transmission line, which would traverse northwest from the TOTW to the Proposed Project alignment nearer Route 2. Mataguay provides a wide range of year round camping, outdoor, and wildemess activities for the Scouts as well a numerous other groups from throughout San Diego and Imperial Counties. As noted, a plan is underway to improve facilities, including the enhancement or development of a number of trails. The proposed substation/transmission line alternative has the potential to be visible from locations within the camp property and from areas outside of the property where activities may occur. Strong preferences were expressed by the Scout leadership. Between the two substation locations, the proposed Central South Substation alternative would be much preferred over the TOTW site. ### Mataguay Scout Ranch

Secluded in a heavily treed hidden valley is an 842 acre gem, the Scouts call Mataguay Scout Ranch. It is 65 miles northeast of San Diego with altitudes ranging from 3000 feet to 4000 feet above sea level. Native Americans called it "Ha-Ha-Che-Pahg" which means the "place where water comes down".

Opposition to the Mataguay Substation Alternative

Dear Ms. Blanchard and Ms. Kastoll:

The San Diego – Imperial Council, BSA joins with the Vista Irrigation District and the Santa Ysabel Band of Dieguneo Indians in the strong opposition to the reintroduction of the Mataguay Substation Alternative (page 18 of the notice.)

At the foot of Volcan Mountain northeast of San Diego, rests Mataguay Scout Ranch. Owned by the San Diego – Imperial Council, Boy Scouts of America, for 50 years, this beautiful and serene environment of more than 800 acres has provided the heart of the Scouting program. Scouting promotes the achievement of skills and the development of qualities that will last a lifetime: responsibility, self reliance, courage and leadership which Scouts acquire through activities such as camping and first aid training, leadership development programs, service projects, and wilderness backpacking.

Key leadership form Vista Irrigation District and the Boy Scouts thoroughly discussed this project "on site" at Mataguay Scout Camp and Warner Ranch. We agreed that the substation should not be at the mouth of Mataguay Valley or at the "Top of the World" site. Also that the power lines should run between the S2 road and top of the ridge line until thy nearly reach Highway 79. They would closely follow S2 until they come close to the historic ranch house so that the towers would not be visible from that historic spot. The San Diego-Imperial Council would also prefer, that the lines go underground from there, if possible, to visually maintain the wilderness experience the Scouts now enjoy.

The Grapevine Canyon route is far less disruptive, allowing for the placement of towers that cannot be seen from either Vista historical sites or from our camp. We, therefore, strongly urge the elimination of the Mataguay Substation Alternative from further consideration.
