Dear Ms. Ikl

The San Francisco Bay National Wildtife Refuge was established because of public demand, and it is still watched carefully for any signs of degradation on the Refuge itself, or surrounding habitats. We therefore recommend Alternatives I-880-B.

Our organization lobbied congress 30 years ago to bring about the establishment of the Refuge. In 1988 we returned to the legislature and, with the leadership of Congressman Don Edwards, saw the Refuge boundaries expanded to double the previously authorized size.

Over the years, we have watched development take place that has lessened the ability of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to protect the habitat and wildlife species, many of them endangered or threatened, for which we requested the Refuge in the first place.

Many of the sites that are likely to be directly impacted by the referenced project are ones for which we lobbled, including Pacific Commons and the adjoining Warm Springs Unit of the Refuge, as well as the mitigation sites for King and Lyons Business Parks. Nearby are sites that are well known as outstanding for resident and migratory bird species, notably the San Jose sewage ponds and the old Coyote River bird banding station.

We not only know these lands well, but also, we have personally witnessed the death of a pelican that flew into a transmission line in the South Bay--a sad and distressing sight. We respectfully request that the Northeast San Jose Transmission Reinforcement Project be planned along existing highway routes and as far as possible from sensitive wildlife habitat areas.

We would appreciate being kept informed of your decisions regarding this project. Sincerely yours,
